Kia Ora

Over the last few weeks, I have taken the opportunity to visit various classes. I am continually proud of how engaged our students are, the level of their learning and the quality of teaching in our classes.

Last week, I visited a year 10 Business Studies class who were discussing the economic problem scarcity and the various ways that we could address this. The discussion by students was intelligent, articulate, and very well led by their teacher.

This week, I visited a year 9 maths class where students were competing in a mini MATHEX competition, ahead of the school-wide MATHEX competitions at the end of this week. The level of energy in the class was high as students tried to solve mathematical problems accurately and quickly to beat the other teams in the class.

This year, we have increased our investment in professional learning for teachers. This aligns with our goal of developing the junior curriculum and in particular how we teach students in years 9 and 10, and already, there have been some exciting developments.

If you visit the library, you will see a 'murder' scene. Our year 10 students must test various DNA samples to find out who 'killed' one of our new science teachers – Mr Comber. Our science staff have developed a unit of work along the lines of the television show "CSI" to teach our students genetics. Similarly engaging units of work are also being developed in Maths, Social Sciences and other courses.

These units of work benefits students by them learning in a more relevant and enjoyable context, while still having clear guidance about what content and skills they need to learn.

Quad Redevelopment

The Board gave approval this week for the school to engage JASMAX to redesign the Quad in the centre of the college. This space has been getting more run down, especially over winter. We are targeting to do this work over the summer break. It will be nice to have an improved space for

Science Block Update

The Board of Trustees is continuing to work with the Ministry of Education to design and build the new Science Block. As previously indicated, the Ministry has agreed to build 11 new science classrooms and with the Board of Trustees appointed JASMAX as the architect for this project.

Frustratingly, the Ministry is being very slow to progress this project. After promising the Board of Trustees that it would give full financial approval for the project by July, the Ministry has now twice changed the timeline for approval to August and now September. We are endeavouring to work with the Ministry to expedite the project. The school urgently needs 11 extra classrooms to cope with roll growth that has occurred over the last 5 years.

We are confident in the ability of JASMAX to design the college a high quality science block, and look forward to getting the 'green light' from the Ministry of Education for this project. We will let you know more when we do.




Year 13 Geography Rotorua Trip

Corridor, 5:45am lined up standing at attention, shirts tucked into pants and hair in low bun for girls. On Monday 31 July, twelve students from Glendowie College were chosen to attend the Blue Light camp run by the New Zealand Defence Force.

Blue Light had 39 students attend the camp aged from 14-17 years. It was a camp for students to get a glimpse of what it was like to be in the New Zealand forces when we left school. The camp showed us the values

of discipline, confidence, leadership, and teamwork. We learnt discipline through marching, standing still at attention or at ease, the marching also taught us how to work together as a team.

At Blue Light, every activity, chore and daily needs were given a time frame. If a student wanted to use the bathroom, they were given a time period such as one minute, and everything had to be done within the time period or else we would have to do squats or push ups as corrective training. We also had to call all members of the defence force "staff". The staff members were responsible for us during the week as well as training us to march, taking us through group activities and made sure we were up at 5:45am in the morning.

During this week, we had learnt a lot about what it was like to be part of the defence force, and self-discipline which is needed to help survive in the defence force. Overall, it was a fun experience and we all came out with something we can take back into our daily lives.



Winning Photo

What is the D-photo Magazine Competition?

Cameron: To break it up for you, the 'D-photo Amateur Photographer of the Year' competition is an annual competition hosted by New Zealand's largest photography magazine (D-Photo) and is only open to photographers who are not at an industry level (earns their living off photography). Every year there are a variety of categories with dedicated prizes given by the various companies/photography brands that sponsor the category. This year was the first time that there was an aerial category, sponsored by DJI, and so with my interest in photography particularly in drone and underwater photography, I decided to combine the two and take an artistic picture from my drone with something to do with the ocean or the vehicles that roam it.

How did you come about taking your competition entry photo?

Cameron: I took a picture in Paradise Bay in the Bay of Islands where I was away on holiday on a yacht. When we met up with some friends with a powerboat, the idea arose from there and I seized the opportunity when a flat calm day arrived to capture the picture.

The picture was shortlisted and I eventually found out that it was an award winning photo in the competition, which I was not at all expecting! I called the picture "Water Wheel". The picture had some post production work done on it to make only the wake of the boat visible, however this was only a small adjustment to the "blacks" and "shadows" of the RAW picture. The picture was taken on the DJI Mavic pro.

You have a lot of art pieces that work with water. Are there certain things that you have to be specially aware of/change for underwater shots?

Cameron: Yeah, underwater photography is a real challenge for both my budget (to afford the proper camera and protection from the water) and personally for me being able to hold my breath for long periods of time (1-3mins) or using SCUBA tanks! But I think that is what makes it fun and why I enjoy it so much, and also enjoy the challenges that come with photography, and in particular getting that perfect shot.

Cameron has a facebook page (Cameron McGeorge Photography) which showcases his hobby and love for photography. Here is his most recent photo, which features a very poisonous fish (approximately 15cm) from the lense!
