## Kia Ora

As I write this newsletter, we are in the aftermath of the recent election and waiting on our politicians to decide who will be our next government and what their policy agenda will be over the next three years.

I hope education will be near the top of this agenda. Through the Auckland Secondary Schools Principals Association, I am on a Ministry of Education working group looking at Teacher Supply in Auckland. You may have read about the issue in the media.



The concern of Auckland Principals, primary and secondary, is that an already significant shortage of teachers will worsen as Auckland's population continues to swell and too few young New Zealanders are going into teaching to replace an ageing workforce. The government must act decisively ... now ... to head off a growing crisis.

It is also interesting to see new young MPs coming into parliament. Chloe Swarbrick, the new Green MP, will be New Zealand's youngest MP in more than 40 years. She is only 5 years older than many year 13 students. Might one of our students leaving Glendowie College also enter parliament in five years' time? Given the maturity and success of our young adults by the time they leave Glendowie College, I look forward to seeing this.

### Arts Awards

This evening celebrates the extraordinary artistic talent of our students, and the leadership of key students (e.g. Freda Song and Jack Barter – Arts Prefects) and staff. Similarly, the Middle Years' Programme (MYP) will not change the ALP structure. We will continue to have ALP classes in the years ahead. Our vision is that the MYP will greatly benefit ALP (and all) students through its focus on global contexts, inquiry learning and clear academic rigour.

## Year 13 Zoo trip

On Friday 22 September, three Year 13 Biology classes led by Ms King, Dr Nafissi, Ms Jan and Ms Chand went to Auckland Zoo to gain an in-depth understanding of the Human Evolution topic.

Upon our arrival at the zoo, we were led to a theatre room. The front of the room had many tables where the skulls and skeletons of animals were laid out (some real, some clones). The Zoo Keeper gave a talk on human evolution, starting with “primates” and since we had completed the topic already, we were able to engage in the discussion more.

The presentation was very interesting as we were able to learn more about some of the individual primates at Auckland Zoo, which relates to our plants and animal responses topic. After the “Primates” presentation, we were split into two groups where one group remained in the room to do a more interactive exercise and the other group was free to explore the zoo, the two groups would then trade places.



We were warned that it was mating season at the time, so the animals may behave differently to how they usually do (showing more aggression and/or courtship behaviour). Back in the theatre room, we discussed “hominins”. The zoo keeper grouped us further and gave us skulls for us to determine where they went on the timeline, from *ardipithecus ramidus* to modern day *homo sapiens* and what the reasons for this were. Next we were given tools and asked to determine their culture (Oldowan, Acheulian, Mousterian, Upper Paleolithic).

Unfortunately, it did rain a few times during the day, however we were all given enough time to fully explore the zoo and see all the animals.

## Stardome Observatory Trip


Classes 9HCK and 9HEN visited Stardome Observatory where we learned about astronomy, constellations and the possibility of life on Mars and other planets.



We were led by an instructor who brought us to a room where we were shown a presentation about research on Mars and the potential of us living on another planet. We learnt about a planet outside of the solar system that has or had potential of living organisms surviving although its four light years behind, and we also discussed the necessities for life on other planets and discovered more about the planets within our solar system. We were shown how to identify planets that would circulate around a star which meant they would have the heat needed for life. This was very educational and entertaining to listen to and has broadened our minds about astronomy.



As we left the first presentation, we were allowed to roam around and try numerous activities and read information that was presented next to displays. We all had fun comparing our weights on planets other than Earth, seeing what each lever and button did and taking photos with the astronaut cut-out.



For the second presentation, we were escorted to a different room in the shape of a dome with multiple rows of chairs that were leaning backwards. The presentation, imagery displayed onto a dome shaped screen on the ceiling, exhibited the constellation and milky way. The show was truly surreal, it opened our minds to how small we

are in comparison to the endless void around us and how undeveloped our technology still is. We were shown a video, by Rupert Grint, of the possibilities of life we might see on other planets, it was almost magical. We saw what aliens may look like, what all of these different races operating in a friendly society might be like. The presentation was absolutely beautiful and left us with so many questions about the outside world.
