Dear Parents,

"More than education, more than experience, more than training, a person's level of resilience will determine who succeeds and who fails. That's true in the cancer ward, it's true in the Olympics, and it's true in the boardroom."

Resilience, or the absence of it, is a hot topic in the

media. It is in our school's mission statement – "We will grow young men and women who will enter a dynamic world, confident and resilient ..."

Resilient people face challenges or failure, and bounce back. An article in the Harvard Business Review identifies three aspects to resilience:

- a staunch acceptance of reality
- a deep belief that life is meaningful
- an uncanny ability to improvise

In times of adversity, facing reality can be unpleasant. For teenagers, this reality may be failing an assessment, losing friends, not getting into a particular team, or not getting into a course at university. Objectively staring down reality is the starting point for young people to find solutions or make changes.

The second element – a belief that life is meaningful. It is about believing that something good, if unexpected, can happen – i.e. as one door closes, another will open. The third element is being able to improvise a solution when they may not currently have the skills or tools to do so.

What I liked about the article is that it gives us adults a framework to teach young people to be resilient. Rather than saying "Don't worry, you'll get over it", we can ask questions such as:

- "So what's actually going to happen?"
- "What are the real or most likely consequences of this?"
- "What else could happen or come out of this?"
- "What else can you hope for?"
- "What are some other things that you can do in this situation?"
- "What are some half-way or alternative things to do?

The more I work with teenagers, the more I see the importance of resilience. Some people may be born more resilient than others, but it can also be learned. As adults, we support teenagers by helping them to be realistic

about the chances of success or failure, and the consequences of either. By helping them consider different futures, and by supporting them to develop the skills or ideas to move forward.


Leavers Morning Tea

New and Readable at the Library




Edgeland – A fast paced read with a twist you won't see coming!
