The Slow Art of Letting Go

Over the holidays I travelled south with my eldest child to Christchurch and Dunedin to visit the universities there.

It was both exciting and scary to make the journey. On the one hand it's exciting to see her growing up and moving into tertiary study. On the other hand it's sad to have a child leave home.

I sometimes describe parenting as the 'slow art of letting go'. Through all the ups and downs, it's ultimately a privilege to see our children mature and leave home to build their own lives.



Preparation for Life

Part of building their own lives is being actively involved in the community. At Glendowie College we refer to this as 'Preparation for Life'.

Last week at assembly I spoke to students about the trend over the last 30-40 years of young people to be less likely to vote. New Zealand is actually one of the better countries in terms of young people choosing to vote, but still less than two thirds of New Zealanders aged from 18-24 vote in general elections.

I'm hopeful that this percentage is higher for Glendowie College students and graduates when I see how many of them are involved in sport, the arts and leadership at and beyond the college.

For example, I had the pleasure of watching a Year 12 Drama performance of 'Twelfth Night' and was impressed by their ability and enthusiasm. It's great to see the next generation engaging with classical theatre such as Shakespeare.

We can sometimes knock young people for their lack of commitment and involvement, and yet when we see what our students do and achieve at Glendowie and beyond, there's lot of reasons to be optimistic for them and our community's future.

Doing some reading around young voters' turnout there were some common trends, two of which I shared with students. The most common themes were that (young) people have two core beliefs:

- this is their world ... country ... city ... community
- the world can and will get better




Year 12 Drama - 'Twelfth Night'

This is the second time Stefan has hosted students from the College.

A couple of weeks ago *Jacob Smith* (13HEN) went to participate in the 2016 New Zealand Elite Motorsport Academy where he was one of eight drivers selected from Australia and New Zealand to compete for one of Motorsport New Zealand's biggest accolades *'The Ian Snellgrove Memorial Trophy'*.

The intense week in Dunedin at the Otago Academy of Sport and High Performance Sport New Zealand provided Jacob with everything to do with being a professional racing driver apart from actually driving a car. Mental testing, physical testing, public speaking, media training, nutrition, simulator testing, sports psychology, data analysis and sponsorship training were all included in the week long camp which pushed all the drivers to their absolute limits.

The drivers selected were all from different disciplines of Motorsport such as Rally, Co-Drivers and Circuit racers from different classes like Single Seaters, Utes and Saloon Cars and all were aged between 16 and 25 years old.

The Motorsport New Zealand Trust panel judged each of the drivers over the week on how well individual tasks were completed. Congratulations to Jacob who received the highest score and took top honours for the Academy week. Jacob has the upper hand at the moment but maintaining focus and completing tasks issued by the Academy will be crucial to his being able to win the 2016 New Zealand Elite Motorsport Academy outright.

The overall winner for the 2016 Elite Motorsport Academy and 'The Ian Snellgrove Memorial Trophy' will be announced in June next year.

Jacob says that he is super proud of his achievement and knows that he couldn't have done as well as he did without the support of everyone at school and having the time to focus on what has been a once in a lifetime opportunity. Jacob can't wait to get back in the race car and apply the skills that he has learnt at the Academy and to go out there and win the next Toyota 86 Championship.

11 Economics visit to New Zealand Steel





Two groups of students visited New Zealand Steel at Glenbrook last week

Last week the Year 11 Economics students visited New Zealand Steel at Glenbrook. The visit provided an opportunity for the students to see first-hand how iron sand is processed into steel. The only operation of this kind in the world! An eye opener was the focus on sustainable practices; from the pipeline pumping a slurry of iron sand and water from Waikato North Head Mine to the steel mill instead of using trucks, the recycling of water and reuse of storm water and the generation of power using hot waste gases reducing Glenbrook's reliance on the grid. On its own the Glenbrook operation accounts for 1% of New Zealand's GDP.

Information Evening - Discovery For Teens

The Discovery Foundation exists to give young people the skills, tools and strategies that enable them to get the best out of life and to deal effectively with life's challenges. The Discovery programmes are designed to promote self-esteem and to encourage young people to reach their full potential.

The Foundation runs their next programme in Auckland during the October school holidays (Sunday 2nd to Saturday 8th) and are able to pick teens up from the airport and transport them to the venue. The venue for 2016 is Carey Park in West Auckland.

Discovery for Teens is a 7-day residential programme for 14-18 year olds run during term break. One third of the course is academics: study skills, speed reading, with two thirds of the course focussing on life skills. The life skills components include: communication, relationships, leadership, goal setting/planning and team work. This programme is also designed to give teens increased confidence and a toolbox of strategies to help them overcome challenges and navigate the difficult teen years. Teens come out with improved self-confidence, motivation and commitment. The programme is full of activity-based experiences and includes a parent's day workshop on the final day of the programme.
