Kia ora tātou

With just two weeks to go until the end of term, our senior students are now in the thick of learning and internal assessments. Many are feeling under pressure.

2019 Course Selection and Enrolments

The school is now preparing for 2019. Mr Robertson, four students and I have visited our contributing schools this week to talk to current year 8 students about enrolling for next year.

Please note that we will take some out-of-zone students in 2019. The recent New Zealand Herald article incorrectly reported that we had closed out-of-zone enrolments. We are taking less, but will still accept a small number to balance our year 9 roll and to keep siblings together if possible.

Year 10-12 students are doing course selections over the next two weeks. We must do this now to ensure we have the correct staffing for 2019, and to start preparing our timetable. Please contact our Careers staff, Mr James and Mrs Caiger, if you want help with this process.

Winter Sports

It is great to see so many students playing winter sports, and parents supporting them on the side-line.

Please be aware that many of our sports rely on volunteers to coach, manage or referee the teams/games. If you are able and willing to help in any way, please contact our sports staff.

I would also appreciate your support to ensure that our players and spectators respect the volunteers, especially referees. Volunteers often have no formal training, but their commitment means that the matches can occur, and I greatly appreciate this.

It is essential that players and spectators respect the referees and their on-field decisions at all times, regardless of the way the whistle goes. If you do have concerns about how a match is refereed, in the first instance please contact our sports staff to follow up.





Middle Years Programme (MYP) - International Baccalaureate



In Mathematics, the Year 9 students are just about to complete their first MYP unit called 'More Than Just a Box'.

Throughout the unit, students have been challenged to consider form and space in relation to the skills of measurement. They have collaborated in activities that have encouraged them to learn how to find the perimeter, area and volumes of shapes whilst solving larger problems. Activities such as finding out how long it would take to breathe all of the air from the room, how many calories are in a giant marshmallow and how to create 3D models

using nets have been used to make the students aware of the different concepts of measurement. The unit culminates in an assignment which encourages students to consider the limited resources on the planet as they design and justify a package for a mobile phone. This assignment makes students consider minimising surface area and volume, and finding shapes that pack closely together.



Vietnam Trip 2018

On 11 April 2018, 23 Glendowie College students, and 3 very brave teachers, embarked on a life changing journey to Vietnam over the Term 1 break.

Our adventure started 3 hours later than we expected due to a delayed flight, but eventually we arrived in Singapore and rushed onto our connecting flight to Hanoi, Vietnam. From the moment we stepped out of the airport, we were shocked by the heat and humidity, which we would quickly have to learn to cope with. As we made our way to our hotel for the night, our very friendly and excited guide Quy pointed out all sorts of things out the windows and we were all totally in awe of our new surroundings.

Our first adventure of the trip was Ha Long Bay. Up early the next morning, we all boarded the bus very sleepily, still exhausted from all the travelling we had the day before. However, once we arrived and hopped aboard the junk boat, we were all buzzing with excitement. The scenery around us was absolutely stunning, not like anything we had ever seen before. Morning yoga on top of the boat was also a surreal experience. The boat trip was a perfect opportunity for us to get to know each other more. Ha Long Bay was inevitably a highlight of our trip, and we were all sad to leave behind the relaxing, but adventurous, atmosphere it held.

The next experience was an overnight train to Hue which, despite the bathrooms and rocky sleep, was a very fascinating journey with unforgettable countryside views. After a rather stressful disembarking, we were met by our coach in Dong Ha and were eager to start the next leg of our adventure.

Following a scenic morning of cruising down the Perfume River, we were surprised by Quy with an 'Imperial Dinner and Show' at which Darby and Ruby were voted King and Queen. Their positions allowed them to demand us to do them favours, which were hilarious and included a lot of singing, dancing and even performing the chicken dance in a painfully long and tedious rotation before leaving the restaurant.

A highlight for everyone on the trip was definitely Duc Son Pagoda Orphanage. We all brought little souvenirs with us from home as gifts for all the children and just getting to interact, play and cuddle with them was an unforgettable experience. Learning about the orphanage and how they provided for all the children in their care was inspiring. Seeing children who were affected by Agent Orange, hit close to home, having previously learnt about its brutal impacts in our Vietnam War topic last year. No one wanted to leave the orphanage and the lovely kids after our brief two-hour stay, and it was clear that we were all very keen to return in the future.

One thing that hit us all hard was the My Lai tour. After studying about it and learning about how horrific it was, it was very surreal and emotional to be standing where so many civilians had been brutally murdered. While we all walked around remembering those who had lost their lives, you could have heard a pin drop. Seeing the ages on the plaques all over My Lai was very confronting and lots of emotions were definitely felt during this tour.

A surreal finishing point of our incredible trip was visiting the Cu Chi Tunnels, which were used as an underground network for Viet Cong soldiers throughout the Vietnam War. This was particularly amazing to see in real life because we had only seen pictures of it in our History classes last year. Our trip ended with a remarkable trip to a Ben Tre Homestay on the Mekong Delta, where we were greeted by friendly hosts who were so eager to teach us about the local way of living. This gave us the opportunity to try some authentic cuisine and truly experience life as a local.



Our journey came to an end in the very lively, fascinating and hot Ho Chi Minh City in Southern Vietnam before boarding our flight back to Singapore, then home to Auckland. Vietnam was a genuinely life-changing and unforgettable learning experience. I think that all of us would agree that we will be back in the future. We would like to thank Ms Simpson for the incredible amount of time and effort she put into the trip, as well as Mr Hurndell and Ms Jones for embarking with us on this journey, and putting up with us for two weeks!

Year 12 PILOT - Polokalame

On 14 June 2018, our year 12 Pasifika students attended the Year 12 Polokalame. This was held at the new MIT building in Manukau City, and was attended by over 140 students. The students attending were Siniva Sanato, Nikita Horselenberg, Caragh Clarken, and Marliana Meteka.

The purpose of the Polokalame was to empower the students to recognise their qualities and be able to shape their nets of influence. The acronym 'TAKI' was used to help students take the lead at school through the following:

T = Talanoa. A chance to talk and to get to know one another in a gender-split workshop.

A = Aspire. To gain exposure to the different study/career pathways available.

K = Knowledge. These workshops were designed to develop the students' leadership skills.

I = Interact. Fun activities to piece together things learnt during the day.

One of the key highlights of the day was the guest speaker, John Belford-Lelaulu, who studied architecture at UNITEC. John spent his time between studies, teaching other students and visiting the poorer countries of the world, helping them develop housing for their populations. He told the students about his struggles growing up and how he came to study architecture. It was a very inspiring speech and showed the students that anything is possible.

The first workshop, TALANOA: TEU LE VA, looked at having each other's back, and talked about the concept of leadership and what it meant to students. They also looked at the concept of Vai – a word commonly known throughout the Pacific as 'water', 'sea' or 'ocean'. It is what connects all Pasifika peoples. The students were asked to think about the responsibilities they faced as leaders, and how they connect with each other and talanoa.

Other workshops were Scholarships, Well-being and Stress, and communication with Tauti Jeremiah who was particularly inspiring.

A good leader knows who they are. A great leader knows how to communicate.

It was a great experience for our students, and they were awarded best school for their contributions to discussions in their work groups.
