This prestigious scholarship is offered by The Holocaust Centre of New Zealand to teachers so that we can incorporate teaching of the Holocaust into our classrooms. This year there were 160 applicants, hence being selected is truly an honour.

We will spend three weeks in Jerusalem in January 2019 meeting with the Holocaust survivors and learning about teaching the Holocaust. These lessons will not only support my teaching of Social Studies and History, but are also relevant in a world where we need to encourage our children to be 'Upstanders' and not 'Bystanders'.




Celebrating Life in the Spanish Classroom

In November, the junior Spanish classes buzzed and got ready for the *El Día de los Muertos* (the Day of the Dead), which is a traditional Mexican celebration mainly based on indigenous beliefs.

The Year 9 classes researched the Mexican tradition comparing it with Halloween. They learned the core vocabularies, such as *ofrendas* (offerings), *calveras* (skulls), *velas* (candles), *cempaxúchitl* (marigold flower). We also discussed the meaning of this 'celebration of life' in depth, it reminds us that death is also part of it and the importance to look at the past and future while being present.

The cultural activities included watching 'The Book of Life', an animate created by the famous producer, Guillermo del Toro, making masks, papel picado (paper cutting) and marigold flowers. Learning about the culture is as important as learning the language itself, and building intercultural capabilities for the future of our students is an essential skill required to enter the 21st century competitive job market.








Non-English Book Donations
