### • Wellbeing Framework

We started work on this in 2019 and will continue this important initiative. The task group has developed a framework that develops students' skills such as emotional awareness and regulation, mindfulness, managing performance and performance stress and relationship skills. It also helps students learn how to take responsibility, be confident in and proud of their identity, accept challenge, and know that no matter what, life can and will get better.

#### Level 1 NCEA

For reasons articulated in an earlier newsletter, staff are working on a school-based assessment framework to replace Level 1 NCEA in 2021 and which will better prepare students for Levels 2 and 3 NCEA, and NZ Scholarship.

Next year, the school will also embark on the next stage of our Campus Vision.

The Board has agreed to progress the school's plans for a new Learning Centre, Student Wellbeing Centre and Whare Wananga. Our hope is to start construction in 2021 after the new Science Block opens. I will share more information about these important projects in the new year.

You may have heard in the media that the Government promised us and other schools a bonus \$400,000 towards property development. This has come completely out of the blue and is a welcome contribution to the college. We hope to put this toward the Student Wellbeing Centre, which will bring the various student services (guidance, deans, careers, nurse etc) into a single, holistic space for students and whānau to access.

Next year will be another busy and exciting year.

The purpose of the day was to engage Māori and Pasifika students in programmes within the University where Māori and Pasifika are under-represented.

The day began with a mihi whakatau from Dr Hirini Kaa followed by a welcome address from Professor Damon Salesa, Pro Vice-Chancellor (Pacific). The day consisted of interactive workshops exploring these different programmes. The favourite workshop was Engineering, which involved constructing a tower from spaghetti and marshmallows! The Medicine workshop had four workstations and involved putting bodies back together, the use of a stethoscope and testing reflexes. The Science workshop was computer science and the students had the experience of basic programming.

As part of the day, there was also a Teachers forum. The aim of this forum was to create an opportunity to share ideas, knowledge and network to build stronger connections between the schools and the university.


