


Vaping

When I arrived at Glendowie College five years ago, I was very pleased to discover that smoking was not an issue. An anonymous survey by ASH showed that 0% of our year 10 students smoked, and that trend has continued.

Unfortunately, with the proliferation of vaping shops around Auckland, we are starting to see vaping devices at school. For those who may not know, a vaper is an electronic device that heats up a liquid and emits (typically sweet) flavoured steam which the user inhales. Vapers come in many shapes and sizes. Some are very small, e.g. almost the size of a credit card or a small portable battery pack.

The Board has included vapers in its smoke-free policy, i.e. vaping is not allowed at the college. The reasons for this is that it is illegal to sell vapers and related products to under 18's; we are unable to ensure that the products being vaped are free of nicotine or other products; and the American Medical Association's research shows that adolescents who use a vaper are ten times more likely to progress to tobacco smoking than the general population.

Recently we have had a few queries about using the Portal, so we hope the following information is helpful to you:


- 1. You are able to CHANGE the amount you want to pay using the up and down arrows.

Young Enterprise Scheme (Y.E.S.) – 'Kickstarter Day'

On Friday 15 February, the Business Faculty took two groups of senior students to the regional Young Enterprise Scheme 'Kickstarter Day'. It is a scheme for students in years 12 and 13 at secondary schools across New Zealand to set up and run their own business.

The Young Enterprise Scheme has regional and national championships. Throughout the year, groups participate in a wide array of challenges to receive points. This varies from pitching their business to a panel of judges (similar to Dragon's Den on television) to showing different methods of promotion. Points per challenge differ, but a total of 100 points is up for grabs for teams. The team with the most points at the



beginning of term 4 in the regional competition is crowned the winner for that region, and is then invited to give a final pitch at the national championships and participate in 'The Lion Foundation Young Enterprise Scheme Company of the Year Award'. The award provides over \$5,000 in prize money for the winning team's school and \$5,000 scholarships for each team member.

At the Kickstarter event, our teams took their first steps towards becoming a future business of New Zealand. Resources were provided for the teams to plan and model their business and product ideas throughout the day, and they were also given tips and recommendations. Our teams already had ideas for their products, so this information was used as feedback for them. After all the regional groups had finished, the coordinators brought 'Speed Coaches' into the room. The coaches are people with business backgrounds in New Zealand. Our teams were given five minutes with a 'Speed Coach' to pitch their idea and gain feedback. This was the first opportunity for our teams to really network with New Zealand businessmen and women, and to gain expertise from different sectors of business.

Our teams are now working hard towards challenge one product validation, which is worth up to 30 points, and will be assessed within two months. Good luck to both our teams! Watch this space!

Scholarship to Yad Vashem Israel

In January this year, I had the privilege of attending Yad Vashem in Jerusalem to study teaching the Holocaust. This amazing opportunity was made possible by The Holocaust Centre of New Zealand. This was a truly life changing experience which will impact not only my teaching, but also my everyday life.

The most memorable aspect of the trip for me was meeting the survivors of the Holocaust. I had the pleasure of meeting two survivors from Schindler's List – Nachum Manor (96) and his lovely wife Genya (92). Their love story is a remarkable example of love overcoming the most horrendous circumstances. I also had the opportunity of hearing Yehudit Kleinman's story of the choices which no seven year old girl should ever have to make.

Engaging with some of the world's most acclaimed Holocaust Historians was thought provoking and meeting with Dr Efraim Zuroff, a Nazi Hunter, was fascinating. The 115 hours of lectures dealing with Antisemitism and the Holocaust will help inspire me with writing our year 13 History course for 2020. The focus of this course will be the cultural and spiritual resistance of the Jews which was truly astounding.

The responsibility that goes with keeping the memory of the Holocaust alive is humbling. For this to never happen again, we must encourage our children to be 'Upstanders' – ensuring that they do what is right and stand up for themselves and others. In the words of Professor Yehuda Bauer "thou shall not be a perpetrator; thou shall not be a victim; and thou shall never, but never, be a bystander."


