The first part of this message was written prior to the news that Auckland would move to Covid-19 Level 3 and schools would be closed. However, I have retained the message because I think the sentiments expressed are possibly even more valid. The college staff are committed to working in the best interests of our



students no matter the circumstances in which we have to teach.

The newsletter has included a number of calendared events that will only be possible if we move to Level 1 or Level 2. With the current uncertainty, we have decided to promote the events in case they are able to take place.

I have been humbled by the best wishes from students, parents, alumni and staff on my appointment as the seventh Principal of Glendowie College. Having been in the Acting Principal role for the past ten weeks, I have come to appreciate the supportive nature of the Board of Trustees, staff, students and the community in general.

My educational philosophy is quite simple. There is a three-way partnership between the college, parents and the student. The purpose of that partnership is to work together in the best interests of the student – academically, pastorally, in co-curricular areas and becoming a positive, caring citizen. Over time, the college and parents continue to offer guidance but step back, so that the student becomes a responsible independent self-motivated adult.

Having been a member of the school community since 1986, I have seen growth and a lot of changes. When I was interviewed way back then by John Somerville, the Principal, he described Glendowie College as "a country school in the city." He wasn't referring to the size, but rather the sense of community. That sense of community is something that still exists today and is very important to the culture of the school.

I am very proud to be the new Principal of this wonderful college. I want us to maintain our strong academic results, the high level of participation in co-curricular activities and the willingness of our students to be of service in the community. Given the current times, it is important that the college provides consistency and certainty for our young people so that it is a place where they feel safe and enjoy attending. As such, our existing goals and priorities will continue.

I look forward to my ongoing involvement with parents and your children.

I would like to assure you that the Senior Leadership Team have been planning for all eventualities. If Level 3 were to continue or we were to move to Level 4, the college would return to online learning. The details will be posted on the college website as well as emailed to parents and students.

If the move is to Level 2, students will be able to return to school, but there will be some organizational changes to meet social distancing and other health and safety requirements. This may impact on some school events and co-curricular activities.

The uncertainty is challenging for all. It is important that we have structures in place to enable the students to learn and to keep them safe.

Gordon Robertson – Our New Principal

History was made this week with the appointment of Gordon Robertson as Glendowie College's seventh Principal.

The all-round response to Gordon's appointment has been overwhelmingly positive: from the cheers and standing ovation Gordon received from staff; to the clapping and cheers from students in their classrooms when student trustee, Laura Oh, advised the school over the intercom; to the social media comments, likes and love hearts(!); and the positive emails from many parents in response to the Board's email announcement.

Congratulations, Mr Robertson – the students, staff, community and Board of Trustees of Glendowie College have made it clear that you have our confidence and support.

School Donations

On a far less positive note, the school has taken a big hit to its finances with the drop in international student enrolments, with no immediate improvement likely for this major source of our funding. In addition, we have seen a slump in the payment of school donations. Your donations pay for many of the extras the school offers our students. The Ministry of Education will not come to the school's rescue, so staff will need to prioritise which activities and services will stay, and which will have to go.

Our sincere thanks to those families who have paid the school donation this year. We respectfully ask parents who haven't paid to consider making the payment. We do not want to reduce what Glendowie College offers students, but without parent financial support the sad fact is that we will have to work within our means.



Blue Light (July 2020) - Life Skills & Leadership Programme



Blue Light has been a registered charity for 30 years. In partnership with the NZ Defence Force they run programmes which aim to empower young people, and which focus on leadership training, practical skills and building self-confidence.

In July, five senior students, Anthony Pome'e (12IFR), Faaiua Matagitau (13CLO), Alyona Derecha (12SHJ), Dominic Baylis (12TID) and Rotem Einhar (12HCK), attended a week-long Blue Light camp at Whenuapai airbase.

Blue Light utilises the camp format frequently, as research has shown that activity-based education during camps are an ideal vehicle to develop young people.

Alyona Derecha, one of the attendees, commented that "Blue Light was a wonderful experience... I wouldn't trade this experience for anything, it helped me personally with clearing up my career choices and I got to learn many essential skills which will help me later in life". She said, "At times it was really hard when it was freezing, but we still had to do our drill... we were all in it together and that helped us through". Another highlight of the course for her was to meet people from different walks of life from all over New Zealand.

At the end of the camp, a formal ceremony was held which was attended by the Police, Defence Force, Blue Light staff and participants' families.

Glendowie College sends approximately 10 students each year and many are considering careers in services such as the Airforce, Army, Navy or the NZ Police.
