Another important aspect raised was to ensure the college values are aligned with and underpin the vision. Further feedback on strategic plan progress will be provided over the course of the remainder of the year.

At the end of the term, we have our annual House Haka Competition. Students have been learning the school haka and a waiata all term, personalising it to reflect the character of their houses. The last whole house competition was in 2019, so we are in the process of rejuvenating this tradition. This year's event will be the first time our Year 9's, 10's and 11's have been part of a Haka Competition here at Glendowie College. It's exciting to see our rangitahi (youth) growing in confidence with their use of te reo Māori.

It has been a busy term of considering biculturalism and a rousing Haka Competition seems like a great way to end this leg of our journey together.



Teachers Only Day at Ngāti Whātua Ōrākei Marae



On 26 August, Glendowie College staff spent our morning with Ngāti Whātua Ōrākei. One of our responsibilities as a school is to incorporate Mātauranga Māori (Māori knowledge) and an important part of this is building a relationship with our local iwi. It really was a long time coming, and not only did we represent our school with mana, but we were also graced by the manaakitanga (hospitality) of Ngāti Whātua Ōrākei.

The morning started with half of the staff making the historical walk from Okahu Bay up to the Takaparawhau (Bastion Point) and then to the marae. Meanwhile, the rest of us waited in the crisp wind outside the waharoa (main entrance). We adhered to the local tikanga (customs) with a karanga (female call), whaikōrero (male speech) by Gordon Robertson and Andre Worsnop and supported with well harmonized staff waiata (songs).

The rest of the morning was spent in workshops where we were graced with local stories which were definitely better than the history books. For Māori, the power of relationship building, kanohi ki te kanohi (face to face) can never be underestimated. It was such a privilege to be standing together on Ngāti Whātua Ōrākei whenua (land) and to enter as guests of our local iwi but leave as whānau. At Glendowie College we understand this responsibility and are dedicated to feeding our students with quality education, an understanding of biculturalism, Mana Ōrite (equality) and to support them to be positive contributors to our community and environment.

Nāku te rourou, nāu te rourou, ka ora ai te iwi.

With your contribution (rourou - food basket) and my contribution, the people will thrive.

Underwater Hockey Championships



On 1 September 2022, 53 players, coaches and managers travelled to Wellington to compete in the '36th New Zealand Secondary Schools National Underwater Hockey Championships' where 40 teams (10 in each grade) were competing for the first time since 2019. Glendowie College qualified 4 teams with our results at the regional qualifying tournaments in Auckland and Tauranga during June/July 2022. We were one of only 2 schools in New Zealand to qualify a team in every grade to attend this prestigious national tournament.



Teams played their round robin games and in their respective pools, Senior Open and Junior Open seeded 1st, Senior Girls seeded 4th and Junior Girls seeded 3rd.

Senior Girls won their remaining 2 games to finish 7th.

Junior Girls unfortunately lost their quarter-final in a very tight game vs Wellington Girls College in sudden death. They went on to place 6th.



Junior Open comprehensively beat Wellington High School and met Nelson College in the final to earn a silver medal.

Senior Open beat Wellington High School in the semis to meet Wellington College in the finals. It was an incredible game which was nil all at fulltime but was won in sudden death extra time by Glendowie College 1-0.

Points allocated based on results saw Glendowie College retain the title of 'Top Underwater Hockey School' in New Zealand for 2022.



Six Glendowie College players were recognised in the tournament team named for each grade. In Junior Girls, Amy Cilliers (9MET), Junior Open, James Hay (11JAN) and Joshua Dale (10MCE), and in Senior Open, Daniel Hoeglinger (11SHN), Otis McKenzie (13GEE) and Ryan Lock (13NAI).

Senior Open captain Ryan Lock was also awarded 'Top Male Player' in New Zealand.

The team of three have demonstrated critical thinking, resilience and problem solving and persevered to complete their work to a high standard. They designed and developed an autonomous vessel to tackle illegal fishing based on their investigation around the issue. Well done team!

Local lad off to Ferrari academy

A local with a love of speed has won a place in a prestigious motorsport academy.

Hayden Bakkerus, 17, has been selected as one of 24 drivers across Asia Pacific/Oceania to attend the Ferrari Driver Academy in Sepang, Malaysia.

Hayden lives in the Wai o Taiki Bay area and attends Glendowie College.

He started his motorsport career at the age of 10 in karting, winning North Island titles, progressed to Formula First in 2020/2021, then onto Formula Ford in the 2021/2022 season, coming in as Rookie of the Year.

Hayden was also chosen as one of eight motorsport drivers to attend the Elite Motorsport Academy held in Dunedin this year.

His ultimate dream is to have a career in motorsport.

"I love the exhilaration and speed, combined with strategy – especially setting up overtakes," he says.

"It has been great to meet different people from across the country at track days including some of New Zealand's great drivers. I have had many opportunities to grow and develop personally in the sport with many people involved and supporting my journey."

The Ferrari Driver Academy will be held from September 25 to 28.

Countries included in the Asia Pacific and Oceania region of the Ferrari Driver Academy include Australia, New Zealand,

China, Malaysia, Singapore, Indonesia, Japan and Sri Lanka. The event has been facilitated by Motorsport New Zealand and is being run by Motorsport Australia.

The first two days focus on evaluating the aspiring drivers,

with about three hours of track time in Formula 4 cars as well as training and testing in engineering and data, media, fitness, nutrition and psychology.

Hayden says he is "super stoked" to be one of the 24 drivers from Asia Pacific/

Oceania to win a spot in the Ferrari academy.

"Humbling to be on the same path that has developed some great talent around the world such as Marcus Armstrong and Charles Leclerc. Very grateful to the team at Motorsport New Zealand for arranging this amazing opportunity."

Drivers will be put to the test, with six finalists heading into the final shoot-out on the final day.

Two drivers will qualify to compete against drivers from other regional FDA scouting partners from around the world at the FDA Scouting World Finals in Italy.

The winning driver from the various world zones will then potentially be offered a place in the academy.

For those looking at a pathway into Formula One, the academy is renowned for promoting and funding young talent. Charles Leclerc and Mick Schumacher are two graduates now on the 2022 Formula One grid.

The EPro8 Challenge is a competition, an engineering and problem-solving race. Every year, over 9000 students from 800 schools throughout New Zealand take part in this competition. Each team of four is based at a workstation containing an impressive assortment of easy-to-use parts and equipment. Teams compete in a variety of tasks such as building large sized structures, engineering using pulleys, motors, gears, wheels and axles, constructing electronic circuits and inventing machines that can complete simple tasks.

The first round for 2022 was held during the month of August in Auckland. Five of our teams from the heats made it to the EPro8 Semi-Finals, three from the Junior level and two from the Senior level. In the Semi-Finals which took place at the Diocesan School for Girls during the first week of September, all these qualified teams participated. It was amazing to watch the teams work collaboratively to solve the problems showing resilience and enthusiasm.

Finally, all these five teams qualified for the Grand Finals which will be held at AUT, Engineering Faculty on 27 and 28 September 2022.

Netsafe – Help with Online Bullying, Abuse and Harassment



Help with online bullying,
abuse and harassment in NZ



What to do if you're being bullied or harassed online

Don't reply: Especially to messages from phone numbers or people you don't know.

Don't attack the person back: Don't give the bully the satisfaction of a reaction.

Have a conversation: If it's safe to do, try talking to the person privately about what they've said or done. Stay calm and let them know how their actions have made you feel.

Cut off the person bullying you: Block their phone number, or block them on social media. You can also report them to the social media site.

Talk to someone: Talking to friends, whānau or someone else you trust can help make you feel better and help you cope with the situation.

Save the posts or messages: Save the URL link of the posts and take screenshots of the post/message as evidence, in case you need them later.

Make a log of the bullying: Make a note of the time and date that the posts or messages were sent, in case you need it as evidence later.

If someone is posting things about you online that make you upset, Netsafe can help.

We've got a friendly team who can give you help, advice and information for dealing with online bullying.

Did you know there's a law to help?

The Harmful Digital Communications Act (the Act) is a New Zealand law made to help minimise the harm caused by online bullying, abuse and harassment.

Netsafe runs a free and confidential service to help people being bullied, including letting them know what options are available to them under the Act.

You may be able to get help under the Act if

- 1 Someone is posting or sending messages about you; and
- 2 The posts or messages make you feel very upset; and
- 3 The posts or messages do any of these things
 - Encourage you to hurt yourself
 - Share intimate images without your consent (leaked nudes and revenge porn)
 - Encourage other people to send harmful messages to you
 - Contain content most people would think is very offensive
 - Share your sensitive, private or confidential information without your permission
 - Make a false allegation about you
 - Puts you down because of your colour, race, ethnic or national origins, gender, religion, sexual orientation, or disability.
 - Contain content that is indecent or obscene
 - Threaten to hurt you or damage your property

Netsafe has been chosen by the New Zealand government to help people with online bullying, harassment and abuse under the Harmful Digital Communications Act 2015.
